Whereas for a number of years, many individuals, community groups, and international human rights treaty bodies have called for an independent inquiry into historical abuse and neglect in State care and in the care of faith-based institutions in New Zealand:

Whereas historical abuse and neglect of individuals in State care or in the care of faith-based institutions warrants prompt and impartial investigation and examination, both to—

- understand, acknowledge, and respond to the harm caused to individuals, families, whānau, hapū, iwi, and communities; and
- (b) ensure lessons are learned for the future:
- Whereas the Inquiries (Royal Commission of Inquiry into Historical Abuse in State Care) Order 2018 (the initial order), on 1 February 2018,—

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#### **Commission Timeline**

**3 January 2019** - Commission work begins

**25** June 2019 – "Preliminary" Hearing

19 August 2019 – "Procedural" Hearing

Late October/early November 2019 - First public Hearing – "Contextual"

**2020** - Further hearings (4 or 5)

December 2020 - Interim report due

2021-2022 - Further hearings (4 or 5 p.a.), round table and private sessions are expected to be held in the period between the interim report and the final report, due in January 2023.

## Hear of the work Tautoko is undertaking







The Bishops and Congregational Leaders believe that every person has an innate human dignity (te tapu o te tangata), therefore:

- regard all forms of abuse as unacceptable and indefensible
- accept the responsibility to continue to act to stop abuse in the Church
- listen to, learn from, and support survivors
- act swiftly on complaints and follow them through
- ensure action on accountability is followed through for those who are proven responsible for abuse
- support the need for the Inquiry and actively cooperate with the Commission
- commit to ensuring transparency







## What will Te Rōpū Tautoko do?

Coordinate and manage cooperation between the Commission and the Catholic Church in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Bishops and the Congregational Leaders in Aotearoa New Zealand are represented on Tautoko along with others who can lead and support the work.

Tautoko will walk alongside both the Commission and the Catholic community.
